

HB 163 (Thurston, N) Anticipated Fiscal Impact:

No Negative Fiscal Impact to the State Health Insurance Pool; Insufficient Information to Estimate Positive Financial Impact

HB 163 calls for the creation of a program to import select prescription drugs from Canada to reduce the cost of these products paid by Utah consumers. The potential fiscal impact of the legislation for the State Health Insurance Pool cannot be calculated based on available information. However, we have provided the published cost of potentially imported products and compared current list prices in Canada and the US.

Based on the cost difference between US and Canadian prices, importing selected products from Canada should reduce costs for the State Pool, even though the State Pool receives lower, discounted rates from those reported above. Savings to the State Pool would depend on the drugs that are imported, the end cost of each product, and inclusion of discounts obtained from manufacturer or pharmacy benefit manager (PBM).
